TOGETHER IN SERVICE - MISSION OPPORTUNITIES – 2021

Presbyterian Women work in partnership with various secular and faith-based organizations on issues of faith, mission and social justice. We answer the call to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

During the 2018–2021 triennium, *Together in Service* is focusing on supporting PW in the Synod of Puerto Rico’s recovery work in the aftermath of Hurricane María. Immediately after the storm, PW in the Synod of Puerto Rico quickly mobilized to serve their communities and churches. Though the island’s infrastructure is unstable and the devastation can be overwhelming, Presbyterian Women in Puerto Rico have a strong desire to help their community develop the tools for resilience, recovery, and reconstruction.

Presbyterian Women from every synod can offer support to the PW in the Synod of Puerto Rico. Financial gifts will be used for recovery efforts in three key areas: water supply, community building and home reconstruction

To be *Together in Service*, other PW groups offer ongoing support to local church or community projects. Other groups commit to answering short-term needs in their communities. Others choose to support one or more of the affiliate organizations listed below:

Agricultural Missions

An ecumenical organization that supports and accompanies rural communities in their efforts to end poverty and address the root causes of injustice, poverty, oppression and exclusion, with a strong commitment to gender justice.

Bread for the World

A nationwide Christian movement that seeks justice for the world’s hungry people by lobbying our nation’s decision makers.

CARE

CARE is a leading humanitarian organization dedicated to fighting global poverty, saving lives, and achieving social justice. Their community-based efforts empower women, improve basic education, prevent the spread of disease, increase access to clean water, expand economic opportunity and protect natural resources.

Children’s Defense Fund

A nonprofit organization that advocates for children’s rights, including education, health care, economic security and other social justice issues.

Christmas International House

Christmas International House is a Christian ministry designed to offer hospitality to international students during the two-week Christmas holidays. Participants witness to the reality that, behind diversity, everyone stands together as one human family.

Church Women United

A Christian women’s movement that celebrates unity in diversity and works for a world of justice and peace, particularly through World Day of Prayer.

Church World Service

CWS is a cooperative ministry of Protestant, Orthodox and Anglican denominations providing sustainable self-help and development, disaster relief and refugee assistance in more than 80 countries.

Days for Girls International

Days for Girls believes every girl in the world deserves education, safety and dignity. They work toward this goal by helping girls who would otherwise go without to have access to quality sustainable feminine hygiene and awareness.

ECPAT-USA

ECPAT-USA works to protect every child's basic human right to grow up free from the threat of sexual exploitation and trafficking through lobbying federal and state legislators and corporate boards; educating first responders and ordinary citizens; and empowering youth to take the lead against human trafficking through education and knowledge.

Ecumenical Women at the United Nations

An international coalition of church denominations and ecumenical organizations which have status with the Economic & Social Council (ECOSOC) at the United Nations. Grounded in our faith and commitment to global justice, Ecumenical Women trains and empowers an expanding network to advocate for gender equality at the United Nations.

Fellowship of the Least Coin, A Program of the Asian Women's Church Conference

Fellowship of the Least Coin is a global, ecumenical prayer movement. Founded on the belief that prayer unites a worldwide family of faith, women from around the world pray for peace and reconciliation and set aside the least coin of their country as a symbol of that prayer.

Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity International is dedicated to eliminating substandard housing and homelessness worldwide. Through volunteer labor and donations of money and materials, Habitat builds and rehabilitates houses in partnership with homeowner families.

Heifer International

Heifer is an international organization that works with communities to end hunger and poverty and to care for the earth.

IMA World Health

IMA World Health provides essential health care services and supplies to vulnerable and marginalized people the world over.

Knitting4Peace

Knitting4Peace is a grassroots organization whose members knit, crochet and weave as a visible sign of the real work of the organization: knitting together the global community. As participants create, they pray for each other, for the recipients of the items and for hope, healing and peace.

Little Dresses for Africa

Little Dresses for Africa is a nonprofit, non-denominational Christian organization originally formed to send messages of hope and worth to girls in Africa, in the form of simple dresses made out of pillowcases. The program has expanded to other continents and now includes boys' shorts, school scholarships, meals, and support at several locations.

ONE Campaign

ONE is a campaigning and advocacy organization of more than seven million people around the world taking action to end extreme poverty and preventable disease, particularly in Africa. ONE believes that the fight against poverty isn't about charity, but about justice and equality.

Partners for Just Trade

Partners for Just Trade (PJT) is a non-profit, faith-based organization that builds partnerships between producers living in extreme poverty and consumers in North America. They address root causes of poverty through Fair Trade sales, education, solidarity and a commitment to trade justice.

SERRV

SERRV is a nonprofit, fair trade organization dedicated to lifting disadvantaged artisans, farmers and their families out of poverty. SERRV sells unique, handcrafted product collections from their 55 small-scale artisan/farmer organizations and cooperatives. In addition to fair wages, SERRV's partners receive training to help grow sustainable businesses.

Ten Thousand Villages

Ten Thousand Villages markets handicrafts created in underdeveloped countries, thus providing a vital and fair income to the artisans. In addition to organizing shops and fairs, this organization tells the stories of the women and men whose lives are improved through these sales.

World Day of Prayer USA

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide, ecumenical movement of Christian women who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year. Offerings collected during interfaith services benefit women and children around the world.

World Food Day USA

Although hunger is a social ill that we must deal with every day, on one day each year, hunger eradicators (that's us!) join together in our local communities to raise awareness about hunger and food insecurity through hunger walks, speaker events, food drives and more.

In addition to these affiliations at the national level, Presbyterian Women at the local level are involved with numerous secular, ecumenical or interfaith organizations that share our PW values.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN SYNOD OF THE TRINITY
2021 MISSION PROJECT
MALAWI PRISON MINISTRIES

Crude roads turn a quick trip to Malawi Africa's remote prisons into a day's journey. Desperate Chaplain Rev. Stanley Chimesya travels a day's journey over crude roads to each of eight prisons taking the Gospel and life saving supplies to the forgotten children of God. Visits are few but Rev. Stanley, as he is affectionally called, continues to deliver the hope and light of Jesus, as well as soap, food, water, and essential support to the inmates and their families. Through the partnership of Rev. Karen Byrne of the Concord Presbyterian Church, Upper Ohio Valley Presbytery, Rev. Chimesya hopes to obtain a new truck to continue his full-time prison ministry. Rev. Stanley is a prison ministry chaplain appointed to the position by the Synods within the country of Malawi. He ministers mainly at the Zomba Maximum Prison which holds 2,500 men and about 100 women, with their children. He also ministers at seven other smaller prisons which houses about 2,400 inmates, where he does counseling, Bible studies and church worship programs. In order to effectively reach inmates spiritually he provides basic resources such as soap, clothing, sleeping materials, water buckets, food, and medical supplies. It is not unusual for the inmates to go 4 or 5 days without food or water. With limited funds Rev. Stanley often uses his own personal funds to meet some of these needs. He has even bought coffins and buried inmates in a Christian service (a first in Malawi prisons). He helps the most needy obtain lawyers to aid in their release. Rev. Stanley has in the past provided supplies for infants who are incarcerated with their mothers. Another focus of his ministry is to keep children in school when the parent is incarcerated as he stresses the need for family communication. In addition, he visits ex-inmates to see how they are living in their communities, sometimes giving them a small amount of funds to begin a small business to keep them from returning to prison. He has spoken before the United Nations about the impact of faith in poor prison populations. Through Rev. Stanley God has inspired a few authorities to even put in wells in three prisons. The one common denominator for all of these activities is reliable transportation. The request for funds from Concord Presbyterian Church and Rev. Stanley to purchase the Nissan X-Trail truck will assist in the ministry of this special messenger of the Gospel.

The Mission of the Welcome Home Shelter is to combat the homelessness in Westmoreland County and surrounding counties. They provide temporary housing and support services to homeless families, single parent families and single women. They offer a 30 to 60 day stay at the shelter. During that time, case managers attempt to address the reasons which caused the homeless situation and work with the client to find safe and affordable housing. Classes in budgeting, housing, home maintenance, nutrition and parenting are offered at the shelter. Each year Welcome Home assists an average 250 women, children and men who find themselves homeless in Westmoreland County or 7000 shelter nights.

Connect has recently opened a Reclamation Center that accepts your donations and the revenue from the sale of those donations help fund homeless assistance programming. We gratefully accept gently used donations that are sold in our store or given to needy residents we serve in our homeless programming in Westmoreland County. For a limited time, we are asking that you coordinate a scheduled drop off of your donations, by calling 724-838-9133, and asking for Tracy Scott.

Items We Can Accept:

- Clothing of any type
- Books, Records, CD's (No magazines or Encyclopedias)
- Furniture (Must be in good condition. No water damage, severe cosmetic damage to wooden items, no rips, stains, tears, or structural damage. We are unable to take disassembled pressed wood items.)
- Collectibles
- Jewelry
- Antiques
- Shoes & Accessories (Handbags, Ties, Belts, Scarves, etc.)
- Household items (Dishes, House-Ware, Knick-Knacks, etc. Must be clean and undamaged.)
- Linens (Sheets, Towels, Blankets, etc.)
- Small Electrical Items (TV's, Radios, Clocks, Lamps etc. They must be in good working order. Televisions cannot be older than 5 years.)
- Computers, Laptops, and other electronic items. All personal information should be wiped as well as all passwords removed. CRT monitors will not be accepted because of the toxic material content.
- Large Household Appliances. Such as Stoves, Refrigerators, Washers, Dryers, Air Conditioners, etc. They must be in proper working order, clean and rust-free and have a power cord. We cannot accept any gas appliances.
- Mattresses and Box Springs. Reclamation does sanitize these items; however, we cannot accept mattresses if there have any tears, holes, structural damage or stains.
- Upholstered Items. We cannot accept items that are torn, soiled, stained, excessively worn, pet damaged or structurally unstable. Reclamation does not repair or professionally clean items and can only offer for sale in the stores clean and useable items.
- Exercise Equipment. Bicycles, Treadmills, Sporting Goods, etc. if in good repair. We cannot accept NordicTrack Ski machines. These must be evaluated on an individual basis. Please call for clarification of current policy. (724-838-9133).
- Garden or Farm Equipment, Tools, Display Props & Cleaning Supplies (Cleaning Supplies will not be sold. They will be used for cleaning purposes in the Store or emergency homeless shelter.

City Mission Living Stones, Inc. is a nonprofit organization whose sole purpose is to provide for the needs of the homeless population. Each year they serve over 500 men, women and children through shelter programs. Services are specifically designed to facilitate the transition from homelessness to independence and economic security. They operate four facilities; a men's shelter, a women's shelter, the Gallatin Living Center which has units for families and Home Again for youth. For more details go to their website www.citymissionfayette.org This website has a wealth of information about their programs and future projects. Monetary donations are needed for several capital projects. Some of the buildings need renovations and they plan to increase the number of housing units.

Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers was organized in 1991 when Trinity United Presbyterian Church of Uniontown developed a senior ministries program, Initially funded through a grant from the Presbytery, the program grew and incorporated other congregations in the area, creating an interfaith network of trained volunteers to provide supportive services and outreach to meet the needs of the elderly.

Their mission is maintaining older adults in their own home with dignity and independence through the support of people of faith. Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers provides free services to the elderly in the county like medical transportation, grocery shopping, helping with correspondences, balancing checkbooks, taking pets to the veterinarian, telephone reassurances, minor home repairs if they own their own homes and more.

COVID-19 restrictions caused a significant financial blow to the organization as they had to cancel annual fundraisers like their dance, golf scramble and style show. The program needs volunteers and financial contributions. Volunteers can do as much or as little as they want, adding that medical transportation is the biggest volunteer need, and most of the transportation is local.

The organization is also looking for monetary donations. A \$5 donation can translate to three hours of service for elderly in the area
