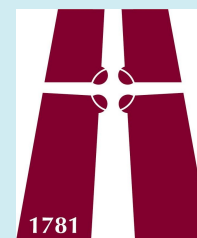

CALLED TO SERVE (All of us)

In the course of working with Pastor Nominating Committees, I often share a cartoon that depicts the expectations of potential pastors. In it, the candidate shows up with his resume (PIF) indicating that he would “like to be considered for the building contractor, janitor, personnel manager, counselor, project organizer, mediator, fund raiser, vision caster, peacekeeper, pastor position.” Of course, this can be true not just of electing a new pastor, but sometimes are practices that we can “fall” into with pastors who serve in all different size congregations. It becomes altogether too easy to rely on the person whose “job” is the church ministry.



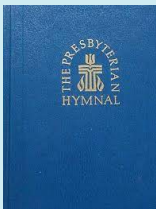
The truth is that congregations that have vitality exhibit a shared calling by God not only to gather for worship, but to be the people of God in that place who serve the Lord and his mission. At one end of the continuum, congregants participate only as passive consumers. The ministry of the congregation becomes one in which they might engage through decision making, but leave the actual service to the pastor or other paid staff. Of course, there can be congregations where there are some at the other end of continuum. In those churches, particular members, while acting out of noble intent, end up

controlling various parts of the ministry and leave no room for others to engage or participate meaningfully. Churches, as communities of faith who are the body of Christ in a particular place, invite, encourage and value those who will lead and serve for God's glory and the mission to which they have been called.

In a few weeks at the end of this Eastertide, many congregations will gather to celebrate Pentecost. Often called the "birthday" of the Church, we acknowledge the coming of the Spirit upon the people of God that transcended language barriers. That same Spirit inhabited the lives and ministries of the Gospel even as it was preached across national, ethnic and social divisions. Yet, not only does the Spirit coming fulfill the anticipated vision of Joel, but also the day hoped for by Moses. When Moses needed help because he was "bearing the burden," the Lord promised that God's power was not limited and the spirit was given and rested on the elders evidence by their prophesying. Moses is asked to stop the two elders who had not been at the tent of meeting, but yet still received the spirit. Yet, Moses proclaims, "Would that all the Lord's people were prophets, and that the Lord would put his spirit on them!"

Today, Moses' "wish" is true. God's Spirit is upon all those who are claimed in union with Jesus Christ, the crucified and risen One. We affirm the "priesthood of believers" not merely as a principle, but as a practice. We understand that "equipping the saints" includes developing gifts and empowering callings among all in our churches. In the end, the Spirit of God can and will bring good news through the active engagement and service of each one of God's people in order that God's mission might be fulfilled.

"Vital" congregations are not merely ones with charismatic pastors nor high-end programming, nor a committed core of faithful leaders, although all of those might be of value. No "Vital" congregations, empowered by the Spirit, are ones who not only understand and teach this from the Scriptures but embody and reflect it in who they are and how they are called to serve.

Purpose of this Study: The *Matthew 25 Vision* calls the Presbyterian Church (USA) to engage our world, so our faith comes alive and we are awakened to new possibilities. The 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and confront systems and principalities that oppress and prey on the vulnerable: the hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor.

We live into the Matthew 25 vision by engaging together in the three works of vitalizing our congregations, dismantling structural racism and eradicating poverty. These three works, of course, are inseparable. This study focuses on the fundamental connection between the vitality of our congregations and the work of dismantling racism.

A congregation cannot be vital without confronting racism; for what is at stake —when racism directs our congregational and community life — is our faithfulness to the gospel. I (Samuel Son) start this study by sharing my journey of this discovery — that the gospel is about how we do church life that is inclusive. Then I will invite you to study some of the scriptures that made the scales of discrimination begin to fall off my eyes.

The day will conclude with an interactive Bible study on themes of healing, led by Bishop David Zubik, Bishop Ketlen Solak, the Rev. Dr. Asa Lee, and Elder Ralph Lowe. 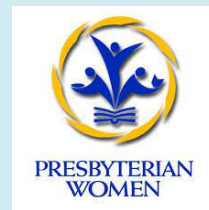
